- sartorial practices as embodied negotiations of the sexual self


Research questions

- How do the notions of *identity* and *bisexuality* become meaningful within a particular sociopolitical and discursive context?
- How do clothes facilitate an embodiment of the sexual self?
- How do motivations and struggles to become visible as a bisexual person produce queer politics of visibility in urban Denmark?
- How do *identity politics* shape conceptualisations of the (sexual) self?

- Wardrobe ethnography
 Wardrobe interviews
 Visual documentation of clothing items









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
